## Inspiration of the Word....

On Sunday August 27, 2017 worshipers at the First United Methodist Church, Franklin, N.C. were invited to participate in a "Kingdom Assignment". The Kingdom Assignment is a tangible expression of the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew's Gospel (25:14-30). Over 300 persons accepted the challenge and each received \$100.00 with three stipulations: 1) This is God's money 2) To use the money to somehow further the work of the Kingdom of God 3) Return 90 days later (Sunday November 26) and report the results.

The idea for the Kingdom Assignment comes from a book (2001) of the same name by the Reverend Denny Bellesi and his wife Leesa. They share in the book how they were inspired by the movie "Pay it forward" (2000) to step out in faith and lead their church in a living expression of the Parable of the Talents in Matthew 25:14-30. They originally asked for 100 volunteers from their congregation and gave each a crisp, new one hundred dollar bill with the above mentioned stipulations.

In 2006 a member of the Cashiers United Methodist Church where I was serving introduced me to the book and together we approached our church leadership with the possibility of replicating the experiment. It took a year of convincing but that congregation responded and we gave 180 persons a one hundred dollar bill (we also invited two other churches to join in). God did amazing things!!

That experience inspired me to want to lead the First United Methodist Church, Franklin, NC in the same experiment! God has so blessed this congregation in its almost 200 year history and especially in the past few years. We have repeatedly surpassed our church budget and as an act of obedience and faithfulness, tithed the surplus to missions. Last year, we "paid it forward" by giving seven other United Methodist Charges a generous gift to be used to step out in faith as they saw fit as well as tithing the surplus to missions! So, the time seemed ripe to cast the idea of the Kingdom Assignment upon the waters of these blessed and obedient disciples and see what new thing God will do! And we are not disappointed!!

This booklet is the record of how God moved powerfully in the lives of the more than 300 persons who received the gift of \$100.00 (our children also received \$1000 to do the Assignment together; our youth \$5000), stepped out in prayer and faith to serve the Kingdom of God, and came back to say thank you and share all that they experienced in this Kingdom Assignment. We hope that our stories give glory and thanks to God, continue to do the work of God's Kingdom, and inspire others to step out in faith and be expectant of the "over-whelming, never-ending, reckless love of God!"

How is God calling you to accept the Kingdom Assignment? We ain't seen nothing yet!

## The Word of God... The Parable of the Talents

14 "For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; 15 to one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away.

16 The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. 17 In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. 18 But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money.

19 After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. 20 Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents.' 21 His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.'

22 And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, 'Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents.' 23 His master said to him, 'Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master.'

24 Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, 'Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; 25 so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours.' 26 But his master replied, 'You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? 27 Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. 28 So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents.

29 For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. 30 As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Had we known David would be handing out money, we never would have gone forward on that Sunday. As we agonized over how to put God's money to good use, we prayed for guidance. Then Hurricane Harvey hit Houston, Texas with disastrous results. We personally matched God's money and sent our gifts to UMCOR for hurricane relief, knowing the gifts would be used efficiently and where most needed. After other storms caused more devastation, we felt reassured by our decision.

I actually struggled a lot when we were assigned to give out God's money that came through the church. It weighed heavily on me that, although \$100 is a lot of money, it is an amount of money that most people, including myself could actually come up with anyway. So, it was like a circular reference where I kept thinking of ideas of things to do and then got convicted that I should be doing them anyway so why did I need the church's money to begin with? \$30,000 is a lot of money, but I think almost everyone in the sanctuary that day could have come up with the \$100. So why can't we do more and bigger things for the kingdom? You get the point....

So I sat on my \$100 bill for a lot longer than my wife did (I will let her tell her stories...she says that she beat me) while I wrestled with what to do. However, I did end up making a point to be deliberately more liberal with my money in a lot of daily situations as a result. Even though we have virtually always tithed, I realized

that there is a lot more money at our disposal that could be used for God's purposes. Do I really need to go there/buy that/go out to eat?...

Finally, I had a clear indication as to what I was supposed to do with my \$100 bill. A woman at work has had a tremendously terrible run of luck (multiple deaths in the family, significant health issues, financial burdens, etc. all at once). For some reason I was led to give my kingdom assignment money to her to help her out. This was actually not as easy for me to do as you might think because she and I have not always been of the same mindset on things. But I felt very convicted and had to seriously humble myself and listen to what I was being told to do.

So, I pulled her off to the side and told her the story of where the money came from, why it was given and what the requirements were. She was genuinely appreciative, but I wasn't exactly sure what she was thinking when she left my office. I didn't think much more about it except for the occasional thought of whether it actually helped out or not.

A couple weeks later, another employee came and told me about some of the conversations that they had with that same woman. It came up that in one of the conversations, the woman had mentioned the money (I had never told anyone else about it) and where it came from and had said that there was no way that I knew how much it had meant to her at that time. Her electricity had been scheduled to be cut off that very day and the 100 dollars had been what kept her power on. It was awesome to know that I was part of her blessing and that the church and God got credit for it.

I think my take-aways are:

- 1-It's never really our money.
- 2-A lot of us have the ability to give more than we do, even if we already give
- 3-If we pay attention, we are given a lot of Kingdom Assignments regularly. The more you look for opportunities, the more you will find, the more you listen, the more you hear.
- 4-The more you give, the more you are blessed.

I am terrible and uncomfortable trying to raise money and wasn't sure how to even go about it. However, it wasn't very long before things started to happen.

I received an unexpected and, if the truth be told, an unwanted check in the amount of \$100. I thought strongly about sending the check back, but I kept hearing God telling me to use it for good.

It was at this point that I decided to advance my Kingdom Assignment with found money. You know the type of unexpected money that you find in coat pockets, in the laundry, and for me, even in the mail. I still had no idea what the plan for this was, but God had a plan and he started talking. I am just not sure that I was listening at first.

I have a dear friend who always posts very positive comments and shares inspirational quotes and videos. While they are always uplifting, for a while, it seemed they were all specifically about peace and breathing. Children's Ministry (Marti Patterson)

The church decided to give the children of our church \$1,000 to decide what they would like to do for their Kingdom Assignment. In August, during Children's Church, we shared the information with the children about the Kingdom Assignment and what it meant. We did a couple of activities to give the children an idea of how much \$1,000 was and what they could do with that amount of money. We taped 100 one-dollar-bills together and we stretched out into the hallway. The next time we met, Gracie Riddle wrote down all the things that the

children wanted to do and then we voted. Helping flood victims in Houston was the number one request for the children.

The next week, I contacted a friend of mine who wrote the "Oops, Your Manners Are Showing" workbooks from our manner's class in August. Peggy Norwood lives in Katy, Texas and connected us with the "Christian Community Service Center" in Houston. While I was on vacation, I received several emails from Peggy and Stephanie at the Service Center. We emailed back and forth about their biggest need. When I returned, I contacted both of them and they were in complete agreement...diapers, wipes, night-time diapers, under jammies underwear and boy's and girl's underwear were their greatest needs. Our package arrived to them on Thursday, October 19, and we have already received a letter of thanks.

With our \$1000 we were able to send 15 cases of diapers of various sizes and kinds and three cases of wipes, 128 pair of underwear for girls and 128 pairs of underwear for boys in various sizes.

On Monday, October 22, the children were out of school so we met and prepared 22 Hygiene Kits and 26 Kids Kits and every kit received a card from a student in our ministry. Our kits will be mailed on Monday, October 30. There are extra cards to put with the diapers and underwear.

The Children's Ministry is grateful that we were able to help the Christian Community Service Center in Houston.



Our Kingdom Assignment using the \$200.00, and our gift of \$400.00, was sent to the Wycliffe Association for the Great Commission carried out through proven accelerated Bible translation. This group takes God's word to those isolated and persecuted language groups around the World, using the high speed Bible translation. MAST strategy (Mobilized Assisted Supporting Translation) empowers the people to do the translation themselves into their own heart language.

Sometimes their work is confiscated and destroyed by officials or extremists in regions of persecution, but through this system, a translator's work is immediately uploaded, stored, backed and protected.

This money was then matched by a larger donor from Wycliffe. Whole regions are being transformed by God's word, learning about Him and Our Lord Jesus' saving Grace. We pray God will bless this work.

- 3. Report back in 90 days with the results.



I am writing this as a tribute to my older sister Joanne Jackson. Jo passed away in Alexandria, VA in August of 2010.

Jo retired from her active career where she was serving as an advocate for children that were assigned to her by the Virginia Family courts. She had also served in the Virginia Family Court's Mediation programs.

After Jo retired, she sought out an opportunity to serve. The Lord led her to volunteer at the Rising Hope Mission Church in Alexandria, VA. Rising Hope is a Methodist Mission church serving a homeless community.

Jo recognized that many of the homeless had little or no means of formal identification. She recognized that there was an opportunity to assist homeless persons get a step back into main - stream society. With her experience as a veteran's widow and having worked extensively in the courts, she set about helping. One specific case in point was a man we call Charlie who was a Marine veteran. Jo went about working with Charlie to get him reestablished with his Veterans Discharge papers for access to VA facilities, Birth Certificate, and Social

Security Card. As a result of Jo's efforts, Charlie today has a room in an Alexandria group apartment and receives his monthly Social Security income. And we understand that Charlie often helps serve the free lunch provided for the homeless at Rising Hope.

When our pastor, David Beam, First United Methodist Church, Franklin, NC, challenged us with the "Kingdom Assignment," I immediately thought about Rising Hope and the care that they provide to the homeless.

The "Kingdom Assignment" is a program where the church gives any accepting member a \$100 bill, with the charge to go forth and do something in God's Kingdom. We are personally matching with a second \$100 for Rising Hope.

I knew that I wanted to respond to something that took me out of my comfort zone. I thought about someone who had recently shared a story about her experience of being homeless for a time. She obviously had a heart for those in need and mentioned a group that was helping those who are homeless or nearly homeless in Macon County. I thought about how uncomfortable I am when I pass those people at an intersection or on the side of the road with a handmade placard that asks for help. I wonder what it would feel like to be so desperate that I put myself out there like that and I wonder what brought them to this moment. I wonder if they have found help from anyone. I wonder how I should help or if I should help. It is hard to make eye contact with someone who is asking for something that I may not give.

I started doing some research about homelessness in America. The numbers are staggering. The reasons for homelessness and near homelessness are as varied as the people who find themselves in that situation. Children are often involved. I asked a number of people about the group my new friend had mentioned and discovered that they are doing a lot of good in our community.

I visited Macon New Beginnings to find out how they are helping those in need. Debbie spent more than an hour with me to share what they are doing and provided me with information about the homeless and near homeless in Macon County. I learned that some others had visited before me and were pursuing ideas. After finding out who those people were, I asked about joining their efforts. Russ joined with me in deciding to give our money to Macon New Beginnings. We put \$100.00 with a group of church members who were pursuing matching funds to give to this group. Another \$100.00 was used to assist a different church member who, through Macon New Beginnings, was helping a family to get into an apartment. Russ used \$100.00 of our Kingdom Assignment money to buy sweatshirts, gloves, and emergency blankets for Macon New Beginnings.

The following day I took the one-hundred-dollar bill to East Franklin School to be used for first grade children's need. After retiring from teaching, I volunteered there in a first grade classroom.

Since letting go of the money, I've realized this assignment opened my eyes to see more ways God wants me to respond. Samaritans Purse, plus an additional \$373.00 from my Thrivent Choice to UMCOR.

This resulted in a total of \$773 to disaster relief.

I had a hard time trying to figure out what to do with this gift. I was so afraid of being like the servant who buried the Master's coins. I couldn't think of anything on my own, so I prayed. There had been so many causes that popped up in my Facebook feed... and this God money prompted me to give \$100 to a friend whose family had experienced a catastrophic motor vehicle accident, and then \$100 to Harvey flood victims, and then another \$100 to someone who I knew would use it to be a blessing to others. I wondered if I was ever going to get the word from God to stop giving money away!

Finally, God showed me what to do with the actual \$100 bill. So, I took it to the bank and split into two \$50 bills. Then, I bought two copies of Mr. Rogers' book of "Important Things to Remember." Then, I wrote two letters to two different families with two little elementary children each, telling them about the God money, put the \$50 bills in the books, wrapped them up as presents, and delivered them. And then I waited... expectantly. I knew that those parents had generous hearts willing to teach their children how to bless others—I just had to have faith that it would work.

When I saw the parents and kids, I didn't let on that I had sent the books... I wanted to see what would happen. In a couple of days, the father was the first one to approach me to say that the kids were super excited to receive the Kingdom Assignment. So, they tagged me in six photos and two videos in which they assembled the boxes, made special cards, and individually prayed over the boxes—totally cute! I've added the photos and videos to my Facebook timeline so you too can experience the "joy, joy, joy, joy down in my heart!"

with her.



So then we had to decide how to multiply our talents. We went to several businesses in town until we found one, Kmart, willing to let us solicit money outside their doors. Charlie broke open her piggy bank and took all the cash I had in my purse. We had \$250. One Saturday morning, we set up a table outside Kmart with a big poster we made that promised we would match any donation made to Noah's Ark Humane Society's Angel Fund that day. Charlie greeted everyone who went in and handed out a flyer explaining what we were doing. Thank goodness I thought to add, at the last minute, "up to \$250" to the bottom of the poster. By the end of the day, we had \$750 to give to Noah's Ark Humane Society. And it didn't stop there: Noah's Ark shared Charlie's story on its Facebook page which inspired even more donations.

A follow up with the school indicated that Matt was doing well now. We are blessed to have been able to help him. And we will continue our help. Thank you to our Church Leaders for making this possible.

Let me start by saying that I love to hear Wes Hirsch talk about his conversations with God while he's sitting on his front porch. The ease with which he carries on conversations with Him is inspiring. I think that during the Kingdom Assignment I may have found my "front porch."

When we received our assignment and got a \$100.00 bill, the thing that stuck with me was that I needed to increase the amount in some way, not just give it away. I did think about taking it to Texas with me when I went on a mission trip there and see if I could find someone who desperately needed it, but that wouldn't multiply the amount. It seemed to me like the easy way out.

I stashed my \$100.00 in a hiding spot under a basket in my bedroom. Every once in a while it would, mysteriously, peek out from under the basket so I would see it and remember that I needed to do something with it...but what?? Also, every once in a while, I would say a quick prayer about what to do with it.

As I drive over the mountain in the mornings, I often pray about the day, my family, for patience with people and acceptance of circumstances in my life. I don't suppose I ever stopped to really listen.

On the Sunday that Wes talked about his Kingdom Assignment, as I started driving up the mountain toward home, it suddenly came to me that maybe I should have a conversation with God, like Wes does. But then I thought about other people who, like me, used to work at Early College but have moved on for one reason or another. And I began wondering if they would just use the money until it was gone and then that would be the end of it. Looks like there is more work to be done.

I made some phone calls and there has been another \$400.00 contributed to the fund. I am meeting again with the staff at MEC to talk about a plan for how to use the funds,

Who decides when there is a need and how it will be distributed? The Student Council sponsor is going to talk with that group about the possibility of having students contribute or do a fundraiser for the fund. I'm excited about where this will go.

OK God, so you don't expect me to do a good deed and quit?

<u>Lessons learned</u>: Listen to God, be open to what He is saying, be engaged and keep working to further His Kingdom.

A mother, her four children and their grandmother came to our county to escape an abusive situation. They had to put all their belongings in a storage unit as they had no home here initially. Unable to afford to pay the storage unit rent consistently, they got behind on what they owed to get their things back. For four years, they missed their belongings. We used our Kingdom Assignment money to help them retrieve these items. It took two trips with two cars and a trailer to empty the storage unit --- 50 miles one way. "It was like Christmas for two days" as they sorted through the bins, bags, boxes and furniture.

Janet: In addition to the gratification of seeing them happier and seeing Christian love at work, I came to realize that we take so many things for granted... and that we should do more to help those who need our love and help.

Dean: Being God's hands to bring joy and relief to a family in need has given me a greater sense of need all around us and our ability to make a difference.

Barb Putman

The Kingdom assignment came at the perfect time for me. For a couple of weeks prior, a need had been tugging at my heart and I wasn't sure what I was going to do about it. As soon as I took the Kingdom assignment, I felt that I knew what I should do. I did want to be sure that it was what God wanted me to do, too, so I decided to pray about it for a week before committing. During that time, three incidents occurred that showed me that God wanted his money directed toward this cause.

At Southwestern Community College, we serve students from 16 to 96 from all walks of life, all ability levels, all academic backgrounds, and all income levels, but the majority of our students struggle financially in one way or another while they try to achieve a college credential to improve their career prospects. Over half of our students qualify for federal Pell grant and many of the families earn less than the federal poverty level. The Pell grant is necessary, but not sufficient, for many students to survive on while they attend college. The other half of our students who don't qualify for financial aid include many families who struggle to put food on the table and pay rent while paying for tuition and books. Very often, students are living on such a tight margin that just one blown tire or an unexpectedly high power bill can set them back so much that they have to step-out of college in order to work extra hours or get a second (or third) job.

Southwestern's Foundation manages a small student emergency fund from which students can apply for a small grant (up to \$250) to cover an unexpected expense. The fund isn't large, but the needs are growing. I had been considering donating to the fund, but there was a part of me that said, "Students should manage their money better" and "They should qualify for aid if the need is that great."

The day after the Kingdom Assignment, I heard from a faculty member about a student in need of funds to purchase a textbook until her parents got paid in two weeks. The student was going to try to survive in the class by borrowing a book, but nowadays, so much of the homework is online that students fall behind very quickly if they don't have the electronic access code in addition to the text. In this case, the code cost \$100, which was just beyond the family's budget. The choice for the student was to figure out a way to secure the code or to drop the required class to take it in the future. I referred her to the Emergency Fund application and the student was successful in making her case and received the money for the code the next day. The student wrote a heartfelt thank you note to the instructor indicating how excited she was to continue with the class and how encouraged she was that her teacher and the college cared enough about her to help her fill this gap. She assured the instructor that she would honor the grant by doing well in the class, and she has.

This incident touched my heart, but even though I was the one that had made the referral to the emergency fund, I still had that back-of-my-mind question about whether this was the right investment for my Kingdom assignment.

Well, I didn't have to wait long to get a firm answer. The very next week, two additional faculty members, brought forward two different student situations. I referred them to the Emergency Fund and these students also qualified for assistance. Applications are evaluated by a committee which considers the rationale for the request, other options the student may have for assistance, and the urgent nature of the request as related to continued enrollment in college. Each of the cases shared with me this fall received support from the fund and the students have continued their enrollment and have expressed gratitude for the vital role of the emergency funds in allowing them to continue in college.

In all the years that the college has had the emergency fund, I have never needed to make so many referrals to it in such a short time frame. So, after prayerful consideration and a little nudge from God, I decided that I would give \$100 of God's money and match it with \$100. I am also increasing my annual giving with a designation for the fund. Even though we don't usually talk about this sort of private giving in public (at the college), I pushed through my nervousness and shared this with about 20 colleagues during a meeting, not to boast about the donation, but to encourage others to consider the good cause of the student emergency fund. I don't know if anyone else has donated as a result, but several colleagues have asked for more information, so I take that as a good sign that God may be touching their hearts as well.

Thank you for the blessing of the Kingdom assignment. It has had a direct impact on numerous people, including me, and the ripple effect of helping students achieve their educational goals will have lasting effects on their families and our community for generations to come.

I attended a local program about the opioid addiction in Macon County given by the Full Circle Recovery Center and wanted to learn more. I made an appointment to talk to the head of the program and learned more about the growing problem of addiction and how it is treated as a criminal offense and moral failing... usually jail time, not treatment. One of the issues that make the problem even worse is the multiple use of needles by various users and the growing problem of acute Hepatitis C, which has increased 400% between 2000 to 2015. This increase has largely been caused by use of dirty needles by drug users.

So I doubled by Kingdom money and gave \$200 to the center to buy clean needles. I learned that clean needles can help stop the spread of Hepatitis C and also HIV.

I pray for these people caught in the web of drug addiction and abuse... and support treatment and harm reduction over incarceration.

The Kingdom Assignment has helped me to pause before judging others and to try to put myself in someone else's shoes. It has helped me realize that we all have the potential for both light and shadow, self-care and self-harm, connection and separation. And sometimes we make bad decisions. 9/29/17 – BAC paid a \$.12 quarterly dividend.

11/6/17 – Sold 4.263 shares at \$27.75 per share.

Return on investment:

11/6/17 -Sold 4.263 shares at \$27.75 per share = \$118.29 9/11/17 -Bought 4.263 shares at \$23.46 per share = 100.00

Quarterly Dividend: 4.263 shares x \$0.12 per share = 0.52

Total Gain 18.81

For the period, the gain was 18.81% and had grown to \$118.81

I believe BAC will grow to at least \$35 per share in the next 3-6 months or increase the \$100 to about \$150.

I enjoyed the challenge of the slaves in Matthew 25:14-30 being given talents (\$100) to see what kind of return each of us could produce. I believe this investment will grow to \$150 in less than a year and, thus being optimistic, I will help it grow to \$200. Therefore, I am enclosing a Kingdom Assignment check for \$200. Thank you for the opportunity.

After hearing Reverend Freeman's discussion of her proposed project to develop education materials, assistance activities and support to grandparents raising grandchildren, I would like my Kingdom Assignment project investment to support her work. Grandparents who find themselves raising grandchildren, for whatever reason,8 often have to face challenges for which they could use some direction or help.

There is a Christian organization called Samaritan's Purse. The primary purpose of its many ministries is to spread the Gospel. One of those ministries is named Operation Christmas Child. They ask people to donate shoe boxes filled with toys, games, personal hygiene items or school supplies that they then ship to many places in the world where the people are in need of hearing the message of salvation. They request \$9 per box to pay for shipping. This fee is not only used to transport the boxes but to print and distribute a brightly colored Bible story book. The children are offered the opportunity to take a 12-week Bible study course. When they complete the lessons, they receive a New Testament written in their native language.

I will use the Kingdom Assignment \$100 to send 11 boxes. I am deriving pleasure from selecting and purchasing suitable items to put in those boxes. When I take the filled shoe boxes to my church in Florida on collection Sunday in November, I will be sending them on their way to their destination with my prayer that the recipients will know that Jesus loves them and that they will accept Him as their personal Savior. I will continue to pray for these children that they will take the Bible study classes and will grow in their faith and share the good news of salvation with their families and friends.

This is a follow-up report on my Kingdom Assignment. As indicated in my first report I am using the \$100 to pay the shipping cost for Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. I purchased items to fill 12 boxes. I concentrated on boys in the 10 to

14 age range. Six of the boxes contain a hammer, assorted sizes and types of nails, and a tape measure. Three of the boxes contain fishing hooks, flies, line, sinkers, and bobbers. All nine of the boxes for older boys contain the following:

Wash cloth, soap with a plastic bag, toothbrush, comb, socks, bandana, two pens, four pencils, pencil sharpener, eraser, two paper tablets, solar pocket calculator, scissors, 12 pack of colored pencils, spinner, small bouncy ball, car, stickers, modeling clay, a game (either checkers, dominos, Yahtzee, or Tic-Tac-Toe), playing cards (either Rummy, Hearts, or regular deck), and a small stuffed animal.

I also filled three boxes for two four-year-old boys. They contained the following items: wash cloth, soap with a plastic bag, toothbrush, socks, expandable "magic towel", stuffed animal, inflatable beach ball, coloring book, crayons, play dough, shaped play dough cutters, whistle, train or car, and rubber bath toy. The remaining items varied from one box to another. Each box contained two or more of the following choices: nesting cups, cat ball with bell inside, wooden shapes puzzle, lacing cards, "magical writer" erasable board, or shovel.

These boxes will be taken to my church in Leesburg, Florida, on November 12 to be added to those that other members of the congregation have brought for collection Sunday. Then the boxes will be sent to Samaritan's Purse to be distributed.

This is a further follow-up on my Kingdom Assignment. A friend of mine used her computer to go on-line to the Samaritan's Purse website to print shipping labels for me so that my boxes could be tracked. She recently told me she had received an e-mail indicating that my boxes had gone to Chad and Angola.

The attached photograph was taken at the front of the sanctuary of First Baptist Church in Leesburg, Florida, after the worship services on collection Sunday. The

parishioners contributed 1,387 shoe boxes this year for Operation Christmas Child.

I've sent him a note of encouragement with a financial commitment to help with initial needs, explained the Kingdom Challenge and why I chose him. I did my fundraiser on Facebook. I have been blessed to have many people make donations...some of them I did not even know. I raised \$1,200 on Facebook (\$200 was the \$100 plus I added \$100 to it) and received \$185 in additional donations made directly to me. Also, I am adding another \$60 to make up for the 5% fee that Facebook keeps.

It is amazing what can come from \$100!

May God richly bless everyone who contributed!

Jim added \$100 to the \$100 he received from the church (God's money) and donated to two fundraisers...one for a family who had a death in the immediate family and someone started raising funds to help them with expenses and one to help someone who had an illness with many related expenses. He is thankful for the opportunity to be able to help these people.

## <u>Part I</u>: A Tap on my shoulder (or a gentle shove in the back)

About a month before our Kingdom Assignment, I was standing in line at the Walmart Customer Service Desk waiting to ask a question on a gift I was buying for my Granddaughter. I was next in line behind a young man in his twenties who was standing at the desk. I could not help but overhear his conversation with the clerk. He was trying to cash a check and the clerk was having a hard time getting it to go through. She had tried a couple of times already. A woman pushing a cart with a baby in it and some groceries already bagged came from the cashier where she had been waiting for the man to come back with the money to pay. As they stood there, the clerk finally said that they would have to go to the bank to cash the check (it was already 6:00pm). They begin handing the clerk the groceries out of the cart to put behind the counter. That is when God spoke to me "Step up there!" Timidly, I stepped up and said, "I would like to pay for your groceries if you will let me." Of course, he was so stunned and immediately gave me a big hug. As I was paying for the groceries, the woman who was standing in line behind me said "Ma'am, Ma'am." As I turned she said, "I would like to help too" and handed me a \$20 bill. I explained that I was paying with my debit card and asked if it was all right to give the money to the young man. "Of course!" she said. There were hugs all around and tears in eyes. What a wonderful God moment!

## Part II: God's Money

I felt like my experience at Walmart was definitely a Kingdom Assignment, so I decided that I wanted to use the \$100 for something else. I decided, after much prayer and trying too hard (yes, Pastor David, and stress!) that I would contribute it to UMCOR for disaster relief, especially due to the hurricanes. Last week in my 2:00pm water aerobics class, Bonnie Phillips yelled across the pool, "Hey Mary, do you still have your \$100?" That got everyone's attention and they turned and looked at me. "Wow, do you have a \$100?" they asked. I replied, "It is not my money, it is God's money." That really got their attention and led to my explaining about the Kingdom Assignment. Well, my friends in my class took up a collection and doubled the money to UMCOR to \$200.00. What a blessing to have friends like that!

I was quite skeptical about how this assignment would turn out. But it sure has made me more aware of things that I can do to spread God's word. I feel so blessed to have been a part of this.

We decided we wanted to keep our Kingdom Assignment money in Macon County. After much thought, we decided to give God's money to Macon Tracs...a nonprofit organization which provides equine-assisted activities involving grooming, feeding, haltering and leading a horse, supervised by a mental health professional. This therapy is used for young adults and children who have mental or physical disabilities.

We added \$100 to God's \$200 and gave \$300 in God's name to the Macon Tracs' scholarship fund, which helps families that cannot afford these services. This donation of God's money went to a family with a five-year-old child who was born with cerebral palsy. This family did not want to take charity, but the director felt they would accept this because it came from God.

James, Ginger, Barrett, Clara and Lucy Stork

We chose to support hurricane relief through UMCOR for our Kingdom Assignment. Since our kids were very aware of the string of hurricane events that devastated Texas, Florida and Puerto Rico, we felt they would understand the need and connect with the purpose.

Our kids invited a few of their friends to participate with them in the assignment - which was to purchase the supplies necessary to make 15 hurricane relief buckets to deliver to UMCOR's regional center in Western North Carolina.

We got the kids together at our house and showed them the video on the UMCOR site, which goes over the supplies that are needed and how to pack them into the buckets. We also shared with them about the Kingdom Assignment and how we were using God's money to help others.

We printed out the supply lists and went to a couple of hardware stores and Walmart so the kids could shop for the supplies. This provided for a chance to teach the kids about looking for deals and getting the most value with the money, and also helped them learn what supplies are necessary for cleaning up after a natural disaster. This was a great experience for the kids - they were enthusiastic and excited to chip away at the list and find the items we needed.

While most of the supplies were collected that day, we wiped out the stock of some of the items at the stores and it took us another week or two to find the rest of the items locally or online.

We used our \$500, plus an additional \$200 donated to make our goal of 15 buckets.

This was a great experience for our family. We used it as an opportunity to teach the kids and their friends about using God's money for His Kingdom and how we can come together to help others in need.

We appreciate the church challenging us with the assignment.

Alton and Rena Sutton

What happened at our church got Rena and me from the stage of talking about doing something to help others, to the stage of doing something. We were both handed a \$100 bill but when Pastor David asked who had not been given a \$100 bill, the lady beside me did not raise her hand but I heard her say, quietly, "I did not get a \$100 bill." So, I turned to her and gave her my \$100 bill since I knew Rena probably got one, which she did. I told the lady for her and her husband to do whatever they thought of with the \$100.

Rena and I decided to give the \$100 to help the people in Africa. Rena turned that money into the church last Sunday.

We talked about different ways to raise more money for missions. I decided to take up money, which the permission of FHS, at the Franklin-Swain football game. I will be turning that money into the church to give to UMCOR to assist people in the different states who have been affected by the hurricanes.

I also have another idea to raise even more money but I have to work out the logistics first. I will discuss this later if it works out.

Scott and I were absent from church the Sunday the Kingdom Assignment was given. Janet Player phoned us and told us about the service, the parable, the Kingdom Assignment, and the overwhelming response by the congregation.

Initially, Scott and I were saddened that we had missed the service, but soon the Holy Spirit showed us that we too had a Kingdom Assignment. The money we were to use was the money we would have dropped into the offering plate had we been in church that Sunday.

We read and reread the parable, and we both prayed. I called Kathryn Sellers. She told us the three points of the assignment and suggested that we look at our gifts and passions for ideas.

Our first feeling was to donate our \$200 to UMCOR for hurricane relief. It was such an obvious need. After we did that, we both felt like our giving to the

Kingdom wasn't over. We asked God to show us another need where we could help.

My passion is reading books; but how could my love of reading help anyone else? Once again, I talked to Kathryn, and she suggested that I call Reach where I talked to the director. Andrea gave me the guidelines under their grant money restrictions.

I was thrilled! I was on my home turf. My career as a public school English teacher had given me years of experience in choosing literature that is wholesome fiction with good, moral, life-lessons without being classified under the genre of didactic Christian literature. (Reach does accept Christian literature, but those books must go in a separate place that is set aside for Church information and pamphlets.)

I chose books whose themes were trust, perseverance, faith, friendship, loving others who are unlike ourselves, and forgiveness. I donated nineteen books.

Reach was happy to receive them and said that their grant will match my donation.

What I learned is that our Kingdom Assignment is not a one-time deal; rather, it is a lifetime mindset. Also, our giving doesn't have to be in increments of \$100.

Scott and I are delighted to plan our purchase of future books that we want to give to the moms and children at Reach: books that will encourage them and will hopefully develop in them the love of reading.

Jaiden Vanhook

I used my money to donate to Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center. Tiffani, my stepmom, matched it and we gave them two hundred dollars to go toward wherever they needed it the most.

I have always felt led to help others, especially babies. I am hoping to pursue a career as a NICU nurse, so I knew when that monetary gift was handed to me exactly where God wanted me to spend it. Many of you don't know where or what the Center is. They are located in a very small building next to CareNet thrift store. They have a waiting room, one room where they can do ultrasounds, a counseling room, and a room where they have meetings and new moms can watch videos to earn "points". The points can go toward baby clothes, clothes for the mom, diapers, wipes and other things for the mother and baby. Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center offers options to the mother as to where to go next. Living next to a college town, you see many girls who get unexpectedly pregnant and don't get the proper care or help they need. Many chose the option of abortion because they think they can't raise a child or that abortion is the only solution.

There are over two million couples waiting to get the call that they can bring the child they have waited and prayed for home. Over 1.3 million abortions are performed each year due to thinking they couldn't do it or there were no other options. The highest reason is 25% are not ready for a child, and 23% can't afford one. Women ages 15-24 cover the 44.1% statistic of abortions performed. Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center is there to help girls find other Christian options. They are looking to buy a house right next to WCU, so they can help bring the number down and show girls there are more options. I donated my money to this organization, because I feel like they are making a HUGE difference in girls' lives to further fulfill God's purpose for life.

As I pondered and prayed over where God would use my monetary gift, several options crossed my mind. Jaiden (my stepdaughter) didn't hesitate. She knew exactly what she wanted to do. One fine Sunday morning Jeanne and I came to church. We had been told by David not to miss this Sunday so we were there wondering just what it was all about. I guess some people knew what was going to happen but we did not. Then we were all given a \$100 bill. What's this all about? David explained the pay it forward concept. I tried to get Jeanne to take a bill but she was apprehensive and did not.

On the way home we discussed what we were supposed to do. We disagreed. Jeanne thought we were to make the money grow and turn it back to the church; I thought we were supposed to make it grow if we could and do something worthwhile with it.

It took us a couple of days to agree that the latter was what we were to do. We also had heard that those that didn't take one of the bills could apply and perhaps get one. We did make that request on Jeanne's part. We did not hear back which was fine. The reason will be explained below.

Jeanne and I talked about what to do and agreed to donate to Hurricane relief and I suggested we match the amount and donate \$200. This is where the game changed. Now that Jeanne was onboard she wanted to do more. "How" I asked. "Well, let's get other people to donate," she replied. I said "OK, let's see if we can get a little more."

From this point on Jeanne was the brain behind what we did. She made a flyer to hand out at our bowling league and at the garden club that we belong to. She also approached family members to get donations. The Pay it Forward flyer is attached.

As a result of those actions we collected a total of \$625 dollars, which we hand carried to a Red Cross chapter. We also got a commitment from another family that did not want to donate to Red Cross but committed to send \$100 to the Salvation Army. That brought our total to \$725.

We were not finished. A couple of years ago Marti Patterson suggested that I donate a TI 84 plus graphing calculator to the early college to give to a student who might not have the money to buy it. These calculators are a must in High School and College Mathematics. Also, being a retired Math Professor, I got one for myself because it is a fantastic instrument. My intention of course was to keep it. However, I have a grandniece who is in high school and she didn't have one. I lent her mine with the understanding I would get it back when they could afford to buy one. But the whole pay it forward thing caught up with me. I went to her and asked for the calculator back. She was disappointed of course but she did understand it was borrowed. When she gave it to me, I said I wanted it back so that I could officially give it to her and it was now fully hers and handed it to her. She is an A student in math and I am very proud of her.

While in Florida and staying at a daughter's house who is a High School math teacher, and who donated to our project, I told her about the calculator that I gave to our niece. She thought that was great, then she went into the other room and brought out an older version of the same calculator, a TI83 Plus that does essentially the same thing with just a few less bells and whistles. She gave the calculator to me to keep. She paid it forward. This has been a wonderful experience for our family. Thank you so much for bringing this way of providing a service to anyone in need.

Pardon the length of this story but in summary.

Donated to Red Cross \$625

Pledged to Salvation Army \$100

Calculator to Deserving Student \$100

For a Total of......\$825

And if you add the calculator back to me from my daughter, add another \$100 for a total of \$925.

A couple of things, the value of the calculators is estimated and rounded to \$100. The actual values would be slightly more for the 84plus and slightly less for the 83plus.

Back to the second \$100 we requested for Jeanne, we decided not to follow up because that would not have created any increase in our project except to add \$100 and perhaps another person may have gotten the money and used it to make things even better.

I am so proud of Jeanne but not surprised. She started skeptically but really got on board and most of the fund raising was her idea.

One last thing, we did not count our donation to Shop With A Cop as we do that annually anyway. However, we would encourage any donations to this worthwhile program.

After I recovered from the initial shock of being handed a brand new one-hundred-dollar bill and was told to pay it forward, it took me all of another five minutes to determine what I was going to do with it.

The initial excitement of receiving the money and all the possibilities it represented quickly waned as I considered the magnitude of the needs of our world, nation and community. Could it even make a dent? Another, somewhat selfish feeling crept in, as well. Mary and I were about financially and perhaps emotionally given out. There was no way that we would supplement this gift with any of our own money. Yes, we still had a "nest egg" that could, in the future, finance that trip to the Holy Land, twice postponed due to illness in the family. Also, there was the "need" to replace, what must be the smallest television set in Macon County. In this way the journey toward completion of the assignment was beginning with a firmly set ground rule that it would only include "God's money." Within a few days, we seemed to be surrounded by natural disasters and the very real human disasters they brought. There was the helicopter pilot who flew through dangerous crosswinds amid high tension power lines, requiring incredible focus to rescue families. All the while, he didn't know the fate of his own family and home lying in an area known to be under 10 feet of water. Also, I couldn't imagine the emotional toll on the 911 operator in Houston who worked a 24-hour shift taking hundreds of calls. Finally, she got someone to relieve her and got a ride home. Finding her house and car completely destroyed, she hitchhiked back to work to continue

coordinating rescues. Maybe, we realized, we already were in the "Holy Land" after all. We sent a check from savings and kept the \$100 bills for another day. After all, if you sit closer to your television, it looks much larger.

At this point the Lord began to call to us as individuals. I began to look around at the people I could observe on a daily basis. As in the experience of working in a homeless shelter years ago, I began to see the poor around me as not very different than myself. First and foremost, they were children of God. The bill, although still in my pocket, was at work changing me. As Mary heard the calm voice of the Lord through the pain of her shattered ankle telling her what her mission was to be, my path was made to cross that of a former student in need.
